Top Nine Virtual 10%s. Please Don't...

1. Be a Last Minute Host

- Signing on seconds before the meeting starts looks just the same as when someone walks into a room seconds before they speak. It doesn't show respect for your audience.
- 2. Start Negatively. Please don't ...
- Bark orders like, "This is your warning, we are starting in one minute."
- Joke about wearing pants.
- Belittle and joke about someone, embarrass anyone, especially if your mute button is not on.
- 3. Have a Scripted Opening
- I get it; we all need notes, but the opening thank you should not be scripted.
- 4. Look at The Screen For The Entire Presentation
- Find a balance between referencing your material and looking into the camera! When you are speaking, look just below the camera.
- Please don't lean back and look bored, sit forward, lean into your audience and be engaging.
- 5. Detail Breaks
- Please don't make weird jokes detailing what people can be doing on breaks. They get it, and you would never say that at a live event.

6. Use Washy Words

- Don't say "things" as in "Things are going to get better." Be specific when using examples. Try not to use words like actually and assume. Use affirming words like believe, trust, and know.
- 7. Include Material That May be Hard to Read or Hear
- Don't post a video that's grainy or hard to hear. Instead, include a video link to watch it later.
- Have a backup plan if your videos don't play. It's distracting to leave slides up too long, especially a funny one.
- 8. Use Q&A Without a Backup Plan
- Don't begin a Q & A session without having a staged question to get the ball rolling if needed, and have content ready to fill gaps if no-one asks a question.
- Make sure the content is relevant and that you have a reason for asking the question.
- 9. Go Over Your Time
- Please don't go over your time and apologize profusely if you do. Just like in a live event, it messes up the agenda for the rest of the speakers. Keep on track, end with a positive, and end early if you need to. Everyone loves an early end time to a meeting.
